As part of our funding agreement with the Australian Government, we are required to ensure that specific “School Performance Information” is made publicly available to the school community. This information has been provided to the school community throughout the year in other forms such as newsletters, notes home and advertisement in local paper.

What follows is a collated version of this information under the headings specified by the Australian Government. The information relates to the 2021 school year and expands on the information provided on the Commonwealth Government’s My School website.

SCHOOL PROFILE

Contextual information about the school

St Peter’s Lutheran School was established as a P-6 Primary School in Dimboola in 1958. It is situated approximately half way between Nhill and Horsham on the Wimmera plains.

Unique features of the school are that as it is a small school with small classes and a low teacher pupil ratio. Because of its size, there is a sense that the school is a family with a personal caring approach. The school is well resourced with updated computers, and interactive TV’s and one to one iPad’s in each class.

St Peter’s offers a safe Christian environment that endeavours to provide a diverse learning environment that nurtures mutual respect, love and care.

We have a back to basics approach. In the Junior room, they use programs including Jolly phonics and spelling conventions, reading eggs and a reading rotation program based on academic level, where students’ complete activities based on literacy areas of the curriculum. In Mathematics they also use a rotation approach to ensure all students academic levels are met. Nelson maths is the base program used in mathematics, as well as maths seeds and maths builder. We also like to include as much hands-on learning during these rotations as we can. The Senior students also use a rotation approach in both literacy and Mathematics. In their classroom they use IT programs/Apps on iPad and laptops like Mathletics, targeting maths and reading eggs. Students also enjoy watching BTN. MAPPEN is a program used for integrated studies. Daily exercise time and Brain Gym/ Go Noodle are also used to enhance and maintain student focus and physical health.

Our co-curricular activities include annual sport’s day, swimming carnivals, cross country and athletics. Book fairs, camps and concerts. There are also many incursions and excursions, performances and annual sporting events involving other Wimmera schools.

Characteristics of the student body

At Census in 2021 the composition of the student population was 52% female and 48% male.

We have 2 indigenous students.

St Peter's had one special needs student who received funding from the Commonwealth Government. To assist students, we had an Integration Aide in the F-2 classroom who worked 32 hours a week and another Aide in the 3-6 classroom that worked 16 hours a week.

We also employed a tutor, using the Government funding, to assist students that needed extra help.

We implement modified learning programs, Individual Learning Plans, Cybertronics program (STEAM), a differentiated curriculum and hands on resources as some of our strategies to support students.

TEACHER STANDARDS AND QUALIFICATIONS

All teachers hold recognized tertiary qualifications. E.g. - Diploma of Teaching (Bedford Park Teacher's College), BA Primary Education, Grad Dip Theological Ed, Master of Education (ALC)

In addition to these formal qualifications all teachers hold the necessary qualifications for teacher's registration in Victoria and all other staff have undergone full police checks.

Other compulsory requirements for our schools are: Valuing Safe Communities, Lutheran Accreditation, First Aid, Asthma and Anaphylaxis, Child Protection and Mandatory Reporting and OHS.

The staff also attended various professional developmental sessions throughout the year (although due to COVID most PD's were online). These sessions were mainly literacy, spelling or professional skills based and were a source of motivation for staff as well as increasing knowledge. This had positive benefits for the students in our care.

KEY STUDENT OUTCOMES

Student attendance

The percentage figure for the average student attendance rate shows the proportion of days each student, on average, attended school over the whole year. In 2021 the average student attendance rate was 93%

Management of Non-Attendance

In accordance with the School Attendance Policy (6.01), non-attendance must be explained by parents. If the parent has not contacted the school to explain the reason for the absence, the Principal or office administrator will contact parents to investigate unexplained absences.

Meetings with parents to negotiate ways to minimize the impact on learning and to facilitate a return to school will take place when the absence is prolonged. If a return to school could not be negotiated, a report is made to the Department of Human Services.

Student Outcomes in Standardized National Literacy and Numeracy testing (NAPLAN)

Each year, all students in Year 3, 5, 7 and 9 are required to sit the NAPLAN test in Reading, Language Conventions, Writing, Spelling, Grammar & Punctuation and Numeracy to establish the proportion for students achieving the national benchmarks.
